Approximately 4138 kilometres

Wirksworth to Canterbury (527k)

From Wirksworth Town Hall, walk through the centre before turning right up Summer Lane at the miniroundabout. Follow the footpath to Carsington Water and then walk anti-clockwise around the reservoir to the Visitor Centre. From there follow footpaths to Hognaston, Ashbourne and then on to the River Dove just before Rocester. From Rocester, follow the *Staffordshire Way* southwards until it intersects with the Heart of England Way (HoEW) near the Shugborough estate at the northern side of Cannock Chase.

The HoEW ends at Burford and from there, follow local footpaths for about fifteen kilometres until you arrive at the Thames. The *Thames Path Way* then takes you eastwards towards London. You will remain on the southern side of the river until Southwark from where *Becket's Way* takes you between the cathedrals of Southwark and Canterbury. For much of the way, this footpath follows the line of the Roman Watling Street.

From Southwark to Canterbury the *Becket's Way* is the route that St.Thomas Becket would have used for his frequent journeys between London and Canterbury in the eleventh century.

For those looking for low priced accommodation, there is a Youth Hostel in Canterbury, the last you will find in England. The best option if you move on to Dover for the night is a Premier Inn less than ten minutes walk from the ferry terminal.











Canterbury to Dover (30k)

Outside the Cristchurch Gate of Canterbury Cathedral is a sign telling you that you are at Kilometre Zero of the *Via Francigena*, an ancient Pilgrim trail that originally went all the way from Canterbury to Jerusalem. Nowadays, the route finishes at **Santa Maria di Leuca** at the southern tip of Italy's heel. To leave England, and for much of the route towards Die, the routes coincide.

After leaving Canterbury Cathedral, pass by the ruins of Saint Augustin's Abbey and then, when you have reached St.Martin's Church, begin to follow the markers for the *North Downs Way* which, after about thirty kilometres and seven to eight hours of easy walking, will bring you into **Dover**.











The GR145

France has an exceptional system of clearly marked long distance footpaths known as *Grand Randonées*. The Via Francigena is designated as GR145 for the whole of its journey across France.

Turn right out of the port and cross into **Calais** town centre, making sure not to miss Rodin's superb *Burghers of Calais* before joining the coastal path to the South of the town. You have twenty kilometres of spectacular cliff-top walking ahead of you before reaching the seaside village of **Wissant**. Treat yourself to some excellent seafood— *moules frites* if possible, and take a good look at the sea because you're not going to see it again for a long time.

From Wissant, the GR145 meanders inland along paths, tracks and minor roads passing through small towns such as **Landrethun le nord**, **Guines**, **Liques** and **Delettes** before reaching **Arras** where the Via Francigena meets the *Cammino di Santiago*. There is plenty to see in Arras, reasonably priced hotels, a variety of restaurants, a massive market every Saturday that fills the large Place des Heros as well as spilling out into adjoining streets, and at least one shop specialising in Flemish beer!

Although it's off your route, if you decide to take a couple of days break in Arras, it is worth taking a bus ride north to visit the *Louvre Lens* which often gets missed by tourists.

As you cross the Artois Plain, both before and after Arras, you will see numerous war cemeteries from the first world war. There is a major memorial at **Notre Dame de Lorette**, near **Vimy Ridge** and an important battlefield museum at **Peronne**.

In the middle of the section from **Trefcon** to **Seraucourt**, you will cross the Somme at **San Quentin**. Originally founded by the Romans as a strategically important border city, the town has suffered the ravages of almost every European war in the last two thousand years, being built and rebuilt several times. It can, however, still boast a fine gothic *hotel de ville* which dates from 1509, and which is famous not just for its many sculptures but also for its peal of 37 bells. The town's *butterfly museum* has a collection of over 600,000 insects!

Laon is a city usually seen in the distance from the A26 Autoroute where a sign directs your eyes to the impressive *Cité Coronée*. As well as the imposing cathedral that does resemble a crown from a distance, the city also has a Chapel belonging to the Knights Templar who used to defend pilgrims using the route.

From Laon to **Berry au Bac**, the Via Francigena follows the line of the famous *Chemin des Dames*, the site of several major battles during WWI. After Berry, however, the Via turns southwards towards **Reims**, entering into the Champagne region and beginning to cross vineyards. The Via Francigena website advises the walker/pilgrim not to hesitate to knock on the door of any of the smaller champagne producers and ask if tasting sessions are available.











Reims

One of France's most historic cities, containing three world heritage sites: the Tau Palace, Notre-Dame Cathedral and the former Saint-Remi Abbey. It also contains the headquarters of most of the major Champagne Producers several of which are open for tastings and tours.

All stages from Canterbury to Champlitte are stages of the Via Francigena pilgrim trail and more detailed information, including recommended accommodation can be found on the Via Francigena website www.viefrancigene.org in English, French, German, Italian and Spanish. If we were walking from Wirksworth to Varallo, we would stick with the Via Francigena eastwards through France, around Lac Leman in Switzerland and over the Great Saint Bernard pass into Italy and the Aosta valley before turning off the route at Ivrea, to head North Eastwards towards Varallo.

Champlitte to Mijoux (272k)

At Champlitte, we part company with the Via Francigena and turn southwards towards Arinthod, in the Jura region, where we will pick up the GR9 (Grande Randonée 9). A combination of the GR9 and the Huguenot trail bring us to Die.

Gray is a very attractive old town bisected by the Saone, with a castle, several museums, a range of accommodation and restaurants.

At Frangy we joined the 'In the footsteps of the Huguenots' Way which links Die and Frankenau. We will be joining this route again for a significant part of the route from Varallo to Frankenau.

If you have followed our route all the way from Wirksworth to Die, you have covered 1929 kilometres. A bottle of *Clairette de Die* is definitely now required!
